The Artists

Talatu Onkala Adiwu

Talatu is a postgraduate of Painting from Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria and has participated in several exhibitions and workshops around the country. She believes in the expressive nature of line, shape and form in relation to space and the aesthetics of colour. She uses the illusionistic and dynamic characteristic of line to reduce objects of nature to their simplest forms and has a strong belief that the artist must do more than imitate nature

Ayo Aina

Ayo Aina is an acclaimed Contemporary Artists with a BA and MFA in 1990 and 1996 respectively, from Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria. He has exhibited widely both locally and internationally, and been mentioned in important art books and journals. He is one of the pioneers of installation art in Nigeria, and also a consummate mosaic muralist. His works are prominently displayed in public spaces across the country.

Shalom Fidelis

Currently an Arts student at Ahmadu Bello University Zaria, Shalom has been painting from an early age. He has participated in several workshops and been featured in a few art exhibitions in Zaria. He has a bold use of colour and has produced some vibrant pieces for the exhibition.

Lasisi Lamidi

Lasisi studied Sculpture to postgraduate level at ABU Zaria and is now engaged there as a lecturer. His sculpture, using discarded items including auto parts, explores social issues in the traditional African setting, adapting the traditional African concept of forward position, mask like face, distortion and simplifying the human form. Some of his recent paintings encapsulate some aspects of *personality theory* expressed by *Albert Bandura* which, he termed as behaviorism.

Ken Okoli

Ken Okoli trained at ABU Zaria specialising in sculpture at BA and MFA Levels. Following a Ph.D. in Art History, Ken now lectures Fine Art at the same institution. He has enjoyed two solo Exhibitions and over thirty group Exhibitions, and his sculptures are currently on public display around the country. Ken employs his immediate environment as the greatest source of inspiration and is currently looking into 'sculptures that move' including car body design and production.

Johnson is currently undertaking a PHD in the Fine Arts Department of ABU Zaria and has a particular interest in the theories and practice of ordinary subject matters for drawing and painting. As well as being an Artist, Johnson also writes on the subject with several of his articles published in journals in Nigeria and internationally. He also teaches the Arts and serves as a Lecturer in Fine and Applied Arts at Onabisi Onabanjo University in Ogun State. Johnson has staged 8 solo and 22 group exhibitions in Nigeria and abroad.

Lawal Suleiman

A self-taught artist from childhood, Lawal studied Business Administration before embarking on a career in Banking and Finance. He continued to paint on the side and 12 years later, he resigned to concentrate full time on his art. His works evoke African heritage and culture especially that of the Hausa Fulani of Northern Nigeria. Lawal has taken part in several exhibitions across Nigeria and his works can be seen in private collections as well as International Hotels and Government Buildings.

Khadijah Iyabo Tijani

Khadijah developed an interest in the arts at a young age, from newspaper cartoons most especially Modesty Blaise the secret agent. Since her days at ABU Zaria, she has been greatly influenced by Bridget Riley and her geometric design and illusionism. She also has a keen interest in amongst others Kandinsky, Jackson Pollock, Monet and Scott Burdick. Khadijah uses her art to express her views on societal issues especially relevant to the African woman.

Yusuf Olayinka Umar

Yusuf has a BA in Fine Arts from ABU, and is currently pursuing his MFA in Painting. He has taken part in several Art Exhibitions at A.B.U as well as The African Arts Resource Centre Art Exhibition, Lagos, and the 'Life in My City' Art Festival, Enugu both in 2014. He was featured in The Fondazione Benetton publication 'Nigeria' Roots: Contemporary Artists from Nigeria' by Imago Mundi 2014. His themes are on human faces and everyday activities, executed using the veining pattern from leaves.

Anna Waziri

Anna is an emerging artist with an exciting imagination. She is currently a Fine Arts student at Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria, and her artistic philosophy is that there is always a way in bringing out an artistic effect. As 'one to watch' for the future her abiding principle is for art to continue to move its audience and not be a passive entity only to be viewed. Openspace is her first major exhibition.






The Missing Piece


